Garden Group For the May meeting members of the group, and a couple of members from the Long Eaton Garden Group, visited Lea Gardens at Matlock. The gardens have been in existence for some time and are famous for their displays of rhododendrons and azaleas. The evolving of the gardens dates back to John Marsden-Smedley, local squire and owner of John Smedley Ltd., the woollen garments manufacturer, who spent much of his life in the village of Lea. He had a great love of plants and for trial purposes, planted rhododendrons in various areas of his land, which proved an ideal sheltered position for establishing them, and which is now Lea Gardens. He also planted varieties of trees which gave the necessary wind protection and partial shade for the rhododendrons.

> Therefore in 1935 he was inspired to build his own rhododendron garden on a site behind his existing garden which originally was an old quarry. Stones from it were used for paths and verandas in dry stone walling

> style. The sand based beds were topped up with soil from parts of his estate and ash from the furnaces of his woollen mill. A collection was started and records kept show plants from leading growers and breeders of the 1930's. He subsequently collected 350 varieties of hybrid rhododendrons and azaleas in a 2 acre site which was developed up to his death in 1959.

> The estate was then divided and sold and the rhododendron gardens were acquired by Peter and Nancy Tye. They were later joined by John Smedley's estate manager, Joyce Colyer, who contributed her expertise and knowledge of the gardens and contents. Nancy Tye had a flair for rockery and garden design and created alpine screes to complement the rhododendron



New areas of the garden were developed with rock screes, collection. ornamental shrubs and trees and in 1960 Nancy and Joyce opened the

gardens to the public.

Peter and Nancy's son Jon and his wife Jenny took over the running of the gardens in 1980 and the size increased significantly with the addition of varieties of rhododendrons and azaleas and more involvement in plant propagation and sales. The Tea Shop was opened at this time which was enlarged in 2007. Their son Peter is now responsible for the day to day running of the gardens.

Unfortunately we did not see the gardens at their best as a lot of the plants had dropped their flowers but there were still a few that were flowering. As we know the seasons are changing and 2/3 weeks earlier would have seen a magnificent display. However it was an enjoyable visit, rounded off with lunch from the tea room and, due to the good weather, we were able to sit outside.

Rambling After torrential rain a few days before our June ramble, it



was decided that the planned route would be too waterlogged in places. Instead, we had a very pleasant walk around Shipley Park on a rare warm, sunny day. Colin, our leader for this walk, always seems to find some paths and areas that we haven't used before, or maybe they just looked different at this time of year. The park was looking really lush and green, especially with the long grasses and vegetation and the very full and leafy trees after all the rain. The new People's Wood, planted by the Junior Forest Rangers is thriving and will be a wonderful





addition to the park as the trees mature. This area has been closed to the public for some time, but footpaths have now been reopened.

We are so lucky to have this facility right on our doorstep, for a scenic view and a breath of fresh air.
